Stories of Interest

30 year GHS member - Oliver Schowalter

Oliver Schowalter has been a board member for quite some time; in fact he can't quite remember how long. He joined the Germantown Historical Society approximately thirty years ago at the suggestion of a friend.



Oliver was born and raised in Rockfield and attended a one room school there. He has lived in Rockfield his entire life and one thing that hasn't changed is that Rockfield is still unincorporated.

Update on the Germantown Historical Society Season

The Germantown Historical Society has clearly seen the results of the sluggish economy, of people preferring to stay close to home, or home period. The visitors that we have seen prefer to visit our free museums, the Christ Church and the Wolf Haus on Wednesday and Sunday, rather than pay the entry fee for the Bast Bell Museum.

The good news is that we believe this is a temporary condition. It is also one that we feel we can manipulate by approaching groups that have a genuine interest in what we have to offer. It is also why the Society depends heavily on word of mouth, active and dedicated volunteers and the activity that has measurably impacted the majority of our visits.

The Museum Director has focused on public relations, membership and securing reliable volunteers to conduct tours, to greet guests and to help clean and organize the society's belongings and artifacts.

While tour numbers are down, the fact that there have been almost 50 press releases in the local paper and two interviews at the request of the Shepherd Express and The Examiner/My Community Now. The Examiner Editor noticed that the Germantown Historical Society was getting lots of press and he wanted to know why? Why was the Historical Society suddenly so active?

The two interviews generated many drop in visits and comments to past president Irene Blau when she was out and about. Coupled with the consistent press releases and the activity on Social Networking, (Face Book, Twitter and Foursquare), the interviews gave a great deal of credibility to the Germantown Historical Society and its recent outreach to the community.

It seems that the public relations blitz has hit its mark. Visitors have said they saw the articles in the paper and "just had to visit". Also mentioned many times is the AAA Travel Guide. In these difficult economic times, it is important that we reach the most appropriate audience with the least cost possible. Therefore the press releases, the online communication and the word of mouth are our best to survive the economic times.

Our database for tour operators is a bit outdated and the harsh times have actually caused many of them to close their doors. Consequently, we have focused on local nursing homes, extended care homes, assisted living centers and senior apartments. Scouting groups are now booking for fall meetings and a scavenger hunt in and around the Christ Church at dusk.

These are tough times and we are doing the best that we can. Slow but sure wins the race and the attempt to build a strong foundation for the outreach and building of membership and interest in our tours will take time.

As members, your input is important.

What do you think will encourage interest in new members? Are there programs or fun events that you would like the Society to offer for members? (Remember, these will require volunteer time.....can you help us with any of your suggestions?).

The Birth of Dheinsville: Home of the 2nd Dheinsville Dachshund Dash

What would Johann Phillip Dhein and his wife Maria Magarita Klumb Dhein think of the nine acres of Dheinsville Settlement populated with what is considered to be the National Dog of Germany?

In August 1842, Phillip Dhein and his bride Maria purchased 800 acres in what we now know as Dheinsville Settlement. Johan Phillip the son of Phillip and Maria also accompanied them on their adventure with his young bride Catherine Elisabeth. Elizabeth's brother, Peter Sinz and her sister Katherina Maria and her husband, Peter Jacob Dix were also first among the Dheinsville settlers. Peter Dix purchased 400 acres and eventually added another 240. Phillip and Maria Dhein purchased 240 acres and Phillip, Jr. and Peter Sinz each claimed 80 acres. Thus the Dheinsville Settlement was born.

The Settlement was conveniently located between the two thoroughfares to the army fort in Fon du Lac. The current highways 175 and Fon du Lac Ave both led to the fort. Fon du Lac Ave was considered the Indian Trail to Don du Lac. The area between these two roadways resembled the highly wooded land of their home in the Hunsrucker Region of Germany.

As pioneers to the area, the Dhein, Dix and Sinz families became acquainted with the local inhabitants: Indian tribes. There appears to have been harmony, as there are no tales to say otherwise. It seems to have been a peaceful cohabitation of what was to become the original business district of today's Germantown.

An addition to the Dheinsville Settlement was the Evangelische Kristus Kirsche (Christ Evangelical Church). Services were held in the schoolhouse, but community growth made it necessary to build a small log building and a parcel of land that Phillip Dhein Sr donated in the early 1850's. By 1861, the small log church was rebuilt of local limestone to accommodate the ever growing community. The church still stands and is the Christ Church Museum of Local History, one of the buildings operated by the Germantown Historical Society.

The Valentine Wolf Haus is across the street from Christ Church, on Maple and Holy Hill Roads. Valentine Wolf was a shoemaker who learned his trade in New York. Wolf bought 10 acres of land from Phillip Dhein and he and his wife Elizabeth Klumb raised 12 children in the tiny log home that also served as Wolf's workshop. Currently the Historical society uses the home as an example of an authentic settlement home. The Jeffris Genealogy Research Center is housed here as well.

The Germantown Historical Society has set a long range plan for Dheinsville Settlement. The dream of the Jeffris Research Center has been realized. The Society hope to accomplish many of the following with the continued help and support of community, society membership and the generous teamwork of the Village of Germantown. Historic plantings, orchards, a fully operational blacksmith shop (run as it was in 1875 by Phillipp Neidlein) flower gardens, vegetables, all with traditional plantings that would have been used by the original Dheinsville Settlers. An open meadow area that would host festivals such as the Hunsrucker Oktoberfest, craft fairs, games and sports would complete the 9 acres of the Settlement.

It is quite possible the Phillip Dhein, Sr and his wife Maria would be very pleased to see that their dream continues. The preservation of their Settlement, the celebration of Hunsrucker Germany and the Dachshund Dash are all part of a strong community. That is what the Dheins came here to build. It continues by the hard work of committed volunteers of the Germantown Historical Society. Especially proud they would be to know that a descendant has planned and put on a successful Oktoberfest for many years. Jeff Dhein would make his ancestors proud.



Bast Bell Museum 10th Anniversary

On June 30, 2010 the Sila Lydia Bast Bell Museum celebrated its 10th anniversary. Since 2000, the Bell Museum has welcomed local visitors as well as those from as far away as Germany.

In 1998, the estate of Ernella Hunziker came to the attention of the Society. Hunziker was the niece of Sila Lydia Bast, from the Dheinsville/Germantown Bast Family. Hunziker's estate included the extensive bell collection of Sila Lydia Bast and was the inspiration for the restoration of the Wolf/Shuster Barn on the Historical Society property on Holy Hill Road at Maple.

The project first began with members of the Historical Society traveling to Hunziker's house in Whitewater where the bells were located to inventory and pack them to be stored until the barn restoration was complete.

To date, the restoration of the barn, including the raising of funds and the project as a whole, has been the biggest challenge, as well as accomplishment of the Germantown Historical Society. Funds were used from the Hunziker Estate, a M&I Bank Loan, three year pledges, in-kind donations, financial donations and five years of Museum admissions and sales. The successful completion of this project shows what can be done when people work together for a shared goal.

The Bast Bell Museum has brought more visibility to the Historical Society and provided new direction for education and informational opportunities. The Bast Bell Museum hosts a Kaffee Haus the first Wednesday of each month. At 2 pm, the Bell of the Month program is led by an experienced and knowledgeable volunteer. Tours of large groups and individuals from all over the Midwest arrive and leave with a greater appreciation of not only bells, but the history of Germantown and our surrounding area.

Sila would be pleased to know that her lifelong collection of bells is being viewed by hundreds of guests each year.
