Bringing back a tradition from years past, we will be including a recipe in the newsletter –

Frankfurter Brenten Almond Cookies Frankfurt Style

2 ½ cups ground almonds 2 Tbsp rosewater 2 ½ cups sugar ½ cup flour 1 egg white Flour for the work surface

Mix the almonds with the rosewater and sugar in a pan. Heat gently, stirring constantly, until the mixture comes away from the sides of the pan. Sprinkle sugar into a mixing bowl and pour in the mixture. Leave to stand for several hours in a cool place. Knead in the flour and egg white. Roll out the dough on a floured work surface to a thickness of just under half an inch. Cut out shapes with a cookie cutter. Line a cookie sheet with baking parchment and bake the cookies at 300 degrees for about 15 minutes. Cool on a wire rack.

Genealogy: WOLF HAUS UPDATE

The Wolf Haus is located in Historic Dheinsville Park, and it is the location where the Germantown Historical Society stores the historic documents and information that relates to the people who chose to make Germantown their home from the 1830's and onward. Currently, volunteers are in the process of discovering and organizing the numerous documents and artifacts that have been preserved there over the time that our organization has been in existence since 1974.

This information includes items like the original land assessment records beginning in 1847, which we are currently digitizing to preserve that information in computers located off site. Already completed was the digitizing of the 65,000 index cards that Carol Barkow created by hand over many years of devoted work. These cards reference the name of any person who is mentioned in the records we have on file, and the cards show what page in a certain document that the individual's information can be found.

As we discover new historic information about a person or place, we organize it into topics, or add it to the numerous family histories we have on file which often date back to Germany in the 1600's. We also are updating and creating story boards which will be displayed to tell the story of our pioneer immigrant families, including specifics about the Wolf Haus and Wolf family, as well as the greater Dheinsville community of the 1800's.

We also respond to requests from the Germantown community and far beyond to help them in their quest for information about their ancestors, or their homesteads and churches. We are currently working with Father Mike at St. Boniface Catholic Church in preparation for their upcoming 175-year anniversary celebration this summer. That experience has been pleasant and mutually beneficial as together we page through numerous historic photos and documents.

This winter we find ourselves communicating via email with people in Seattle, Washington, northern Wisconsin, and even Ellern and Seibersbach, Germany. Those contacts have provided new information like the exact location of some ancestral homes of the Dhein, Dix, Klumb, and Hoelz families, at the time they left for Amerika.

If anyone is interested in helping us with this type of volunteer "work", we are happy to have you join us. Please contact me so we can talk about it. The Wolf Haus will be opening again to the public on Wednesday, June 3rd. All are Willcommen.
