# Newest Book Available

*Germantown in the 20<sup>th</sup> Century, Part 1: 1900-1959* is here and ready to be enjoyed for years to come. Now on sale by the Germantown Historical Society, this book is a pictorial journey through the first part of the twentieth century, decade-by-decade. The reader will find in each chapter a review of significant international, national, and state-wide events, all designed to put in perspective what occurred locally in Germantown and the surrounding area during the decade. Interesting captioned photos of developing agricultural and commercial ventures, along with schools, churches, recreation and family life are revealed as this sleepy, rural area slowly grew to a booming city suburb. The book is made personal through rarely-seen photos provided by people in our community willing to share their family's story. The 128-page 8"x11" hard cover book, printed on high quality, durable paper, sells for \$55.00, tax included. It is available at the publisher, Allied Digital Photo, at German Glass and Gifts, and at Sinter Klausen Christmas Shop. ## **A bit about the author...**

Bill Gay arrived in Germantown in August of 1965, fresh out of college, happy to have found his first job teaching English and Spanish. It turned out to be his *only* teaching job. He stayed until his retirement in 2001. In the early seventies he was asked to be the advisor to the National Honor Society, and it was in that capacity that his long association with the Germantown Historical Society began. In 1974 he was asked by the society's president, Irene Blau, if NHS would be interested in a community service project, helping to ready the Dheinsville Christ Church building for its new role as a museum in time for the nation's 1976 bi-centennial celebration.

It was a perfect fit for NHS, as students are selected for membership in part because of their leadership and service. It was also a perfect fit for Bill, with his love of history and his belief that the way to get young people to have a sense of ownership of their hometown was to engage them in something special. Over the next 27 years, the group was at the museum twice a year, cleaning, painting, weeding, moving things, clearing out the Wolf barn, and much more. (The most exciting moment came on a springtime Saturday workday when a rep from Old World Wisconsin crawling around in the attic discovered that the Wolf Haus was a half-timbered pioneer home.)....
