Germantown history and genealogy.....

The Wolf Haus is one of several museum buildings in the Dheinsville Settlement.



It is a half timber house built 1854 by Valentine Wolf for his wife and family of twelve children. Valentine and Margaretha Klumb Wolf were born in the Hunsruck region of Germany. They met and were married in New York City in 1847. They arrived in Milwaukee in 1852 with their first two children. Their third child was born in Milwaukee before they traveled on to Dheinsville. There Valentine purchased a 10 acre parcel from Philipp Dhein in section 9 town 9 Germantown. They built their half timber home with infill of clay-loam from the land and rye straw binder from the fields. A partial wall is on display.

Between 1854 and 1880 nine more children were born. Valentine opened his shoemaker shop in his home. A stone addition to expand the house was added in 1862.

In 1896 the congregation of Christ Evangelical Church purchased one half acre of the Wolf property for the new parsonage. The remaining nine and one half acres which is currently owned by the Village of Germantown is known as Historic Dheinsville Park.

Over the last two years we have created or updated displays at the Wolf Haus museum with the history of the early settlers in story boards showing our ancestors' route as they traveled from the Hunsruck Region of Germany to the area now known as Germantown. The boards include pictures of the early buildings of commerce, family homesteads and genealogy of pioneer families.

In the building addition is a shoemaker's shop showing the equipment used in making shoes and boots. The equipment on display is from the same time period that Valentine was a shoemaker. These metal forms and tools were donated to the museum by Al Dobberfuhl. There are also several artifacts that actually belonged to the Valentine Wolf family which include metal forms of shoe making equipment and a dress that was donated in 2020 by the family's great great granddaughter Jane Bielingmaier. Other boards show the Wolf family genealogy in pictures and dates of events in their lives.



In 2020 a tribute to Gladys Muehl was created in the Wolf Haus to thank her for her contribution which made the new permanent structure Muehl Family Festhalle a reality.

In 2020 St Boniface Catholic Church was to celebrate 175 years as a parish but due to covid it has been postponed until 2022. A story board showing the history of St. Boniface in pictures was created to commemorate this occasion. The St. Boniface Catholic Church is the oldest parish in Washington County.

The Wolf Haus Jeffris Genealogy Research Room continues to add family history information and assist people in researching their family history. Please come to enjoy a visit back to Dheinsville's beginnings. Open every Wednesday 1-4, June 1 to October 1.
